The third meeting of the 2020-2021 BB's Bridge Building class was held Saturday, November 21, 2020. Mrs. Sawanda Washington, principal at East Sunflower Elementary conducted a session entitled "The Journey of a Leader." After Mrs. Washington's presentation, the Ambassadors defined leadership, received information on the six leadership styles and took a leadership assessment, which helped them to discovery their own leadership style.





On January 16, 2021, the Ambassadors received valuable information from Representative Otis Anthony, II, who represents House District 31, about the importance of forming relationships to get bills passed and never quitting or giving up on their dreams. On June 18-20, the Ambassadors travelled to various cities in Alabama to conclude the 2020-2021 B.B. Bridge Building Ambassadors Youth Leadership Program. The trip included stops and tours in Selma, AL, Montgomery, AL, and Birmingham, AL. The trip allowed the Ambassadors to continue their educational museum experience by visiting the Edmund Pettus Bridge & Selma Interpretive Center, the Rosa Parks Arrest Site, the National Memorial for Peace and Justice and the Legacy Museum, the Freedom Rides Museum, and the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute.



The B.B.'s Bridge Building Ambassadors toured the Mississippi Delta to explore blues markers and historical sites on Saturday, March 20, 2021. They were accompanied by Ambassador Coordinator, Khalilah Ransom. The tour began in Indianola, MS, which included stops by Club Ebony, Church Street, a marker of young Riley King, and Albert King. The Ambassadors then headed to Holly Ridge, MS, to the gravesite of Charley Patton, the Founder of the Delta Blues. They passed through Leland, MS, to view blues markers for Highways 61 & 10, Ruby's Nite Spot, and Johnny Winter, and Son Thomas. The tour ended in Shaw, MS, where they viewed the blues marker of David "Honeyboy" Edwards.



On May 8, 2021, the ambassadors visited the MS Civil Rights Museum in Jackson, MS. The museum contains eight galleries that focus on the years of 1945-1976 when MS was ground zero for the national Civil Rights Movement. The ambassadors were divided into three groups and were each given three galleries to review and take notes. They also received a very heartening account from Hezekiah Watkins about his experiences during the Civil Rights Era.
